PREPARING FOR ETERNITY

How long is eternity? Pondering such a concept can, indeed, give us a headache! A simple dictionary definition of the word describes it as "infinite time" or "time without a beginning or ending." When we think of eternity in the framework of our faith, however, we focus in on two specific areas: eternal life in heaven or eternal damnation in hell. There is no question at all concerning where we WANT to spend eternity. The question is: How do we earn a spot in that wonderful place "where there is no longer sickness, nor sorrow, nor sighing, but life everlasting?"

Like everything else, the answer lies in the Scriptures. Christ frequently spoke of eternal life and He was quite specific as to how it can be attained. When a certain lawyer approached Him and questioned what he needed to do to inherit it, Christ told him that he must "... love the lord with all your heart, soul, strength and mind, and love your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10:27) On another occasion when questioned in a similar manner, the lord urged His interrogator to "keep the commandments" and to "sell what you own and give it to the poor." Still another time, He reminded Nicodemus that "... God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but shall have everlasting life." (John 3:15) To gain eternal life, Jesus also told His followers that they must "eat His Flesh" and "drink His Blood" - a clear reference to the reception of Holy Communion.

To sum all this up, we can confidently say that if we love God, if we follow His Divine laws, if we care for the needs of others and live a sacramental life, we, too, will be numbered among the saints in God's heavenly kingdom for all of eternity. Apostle Paul tells us "... eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him." (1 Corinthians 2:9)
